PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To all members, volunteers and friends of the Goochland Historical Society I offer my greetings and salutations. Let's start to get acquainted.

In an effort to begin to know something about the Goochland Historical Society, I've found some good teachers. Ennion and Mary Williams, a part of the founding group of the Society, kindly loaned me their collection of Society publications from 1969 through 2008 to read and to absorb. Temple Bayliss, the Society's immediate past president, has been generous in sharing many of his ideas and aspirations concerning the Society. And, of course, our Executive Director, Phyllis Silber, is teaching me the everyday workings of the organization.

21 January, my first meeting with the Society's Board of Trustees, was an important learning experience. At that meeting, I saw the organization in action. Beginning with reports from Andy Donnelley and Marty MacMillian, our 1st Vice President and 2nd Vice President respectively, whose firm grasp on the intellectual as well as the social life of the Society assures Society members that now is an exciting time to volunteer and participate in what is the premier historical organization in Goochland County.

But it's not only the public proceedings of the Society that are exciting. The behind the scenes preservation, research and archival activities are equally impressive. During the meeting I was introduced to Carol Salmon, the official Archivist, who is responsible for keeping the Society's collections of books, manuscripts and artifacts. Later in the meeting, two board members, Sandie Warwick and Carolyn Comerford, reported on the Society's oral history program. Since I had met both of these dedicated ladies at an earlier committee meeting, I had a good idea about what they were going to report. Their perspective on the importance of oral history convinced me that this project truly has the potential to preserve the heart and soul of Goochland's more recent historical ambiance at a time when the character of the county is under stress and experiencing serious change.

Although a treasurer's report is not usually intended to be a high point at any meeting, the Society's Treasurer, Fred Sorrell,



is convincingly reassuring. The thoroughness of his report, especially during the present recession, shows the Society to be financially sound at a time when many similar organizations are in difficulty.

Following Fred's report, Ed Wilson gave the board his report on what will soon become Goochland County's first historical county highway marker, the Ellisville Bridge marker. Then Doug Price reported on his long-time area of concern, publications. Doug's Goochland calendar

and the Society's scholarly magazine are continuing high water marks for this organization as well as for Goochland County and the Commonwealth of Virginia.

And who am I? You should know that I'm not from Goochland, although I now live in the county. I do however, have strong Virginia ties, especially for a native Minnesotan. My wife is from Richmond with roots in Hanover County (she is related to the John Tinsley of Tinsleyville in Goochland County). I was the first professional director of the Museum of the Confederacy in Richmond (my Great Uncle, a German, was a Confederate officer) and a past president of the Virginia Association of Museums. Professionally, I was trained at the Henry Francis duPont Winterthur Museum as a museum curator although I spent my entire career as a museum director (I retired in 2000). I directed a general museum in Houston, Texas and was a founder and president of the Texas Association of Museums. For ten years I was the director of an art museum in Roanoke, Virginia (now the Taubman Museum). More recently, I designed the interior and directed the Moss Museum in Waynesboro where I became well-known for my interest in popular art. I am the author of *P Buckley Moss, Painting the Joy of the Soul*.

I look forward to serving the Goochland Historical Society and working with the people who love Goochland, respect history, and want to preserve the best from the past to serve the intellectual and emotional needs of the future. Thank you for this opportunity.

SOCIETY'S MAY MEETING TO BE HELD AT "SOLDIER'S LODGE"

The spring membership meeting of the Goochland County Historical Society will take place at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 17, 2009 at "Soldier's Lodge" the home of Louise and Earl Thompson.

The guest speaker will be John Chettle, a Rhodes Scholar, attorney, lecturer and author. A native of South Africa, Mr. Chettle holds law degrees from the University of Witwatersrand and Georgetown University.

He has appeared on Meet the Press, the Today Show, CBS News and the Lehrer News Hour.

He has been teaching a course on the U.S. Presidency at Virginia Commonwealth University.

He is currently completing a book, which will be the subject of his talk, "What Do Presidents Read: And Why It Matters."

In it he deals briefly with three early Presidents, Washington, John Adams and Jefferson; and in greater detail with Lincoln, Theodore Roosevelt, Wilson, FDR, Truman, Eisenhower and Reagan. Finally, to consider more contemporary Presidents, he deals with Bill Clinton and George W. Bush, for which he also had extensive interviews, including one with President Bush Himself.

This will prove to be a most interesting topic.

The public is invited and refreshments will be served.

BOARD MEMBERS ATTEND ORAL HISTORY CLASS

Last year, Society members learned that there may be gold in the hills of western Goochland. The county's real treasure, however, is her people and their witness to history.

Oral history is a powerful tool for preserving the past. As people, places and events are recalled in this very personal manner, they are far more vivid than the dry and distant words of the historian.

As Goochland grows and changes, capturing and preserving the memories of earlier times in the words of those who were there is a critical mission for the Society.

Carolyn Parrish Comerford and Sandie Warwick recently completed a four session course in the technology and techniques of recording oral history at the Virginia Historical Society.

Experienced practitioners in the field of oral history discussed the methodology for gleaning those memories to gain insight on the past. Practical instruction for preserving those recollections in sound, image and print was also part of the course.

Speakers included professors of history and oral historians who have captured the essence of significant periods in recent American history. They discussed interview techniques and methods of preserving and organizing this type of historical record.

In coming months, these women will team up with Jeff Mabry and Fred Sorrell to conduct interviews that will be recorded on both audio and videotape.

FIRST COUNTY HIGHWAY MARKER TO BE UNVEILED

On Sunday, February 15 at 3:00 p.m., the Goochland County Historical Society and the Goochland County Board of Supervisors will unveil the first County highway marker to commemorate the Ellisville Community on River Road. The marker will officially name the bridge which crosses Highway 288 on River Road, the Ellisville Bridge, in honor of the Ellis family. This bridge was not eligible for a Virginia Highway marker, so the Historical Society initiated a County marker program which has been approved and supported by the Goochland County Board of Supervisors.

The unveiling ceremony will take place at the bridge on River Road across from the Abbey. A reception following the ceremony will be held at the St. James Baptist Church, 401 Blair Road, Richmond, VA 23103. William Quarles will be Master of Ceremonies and a representative from the Board of Supervisors will speak on behalf of the Board. A presentation about the Ellis family will also be given.

The public is welcome to attend this historic event.

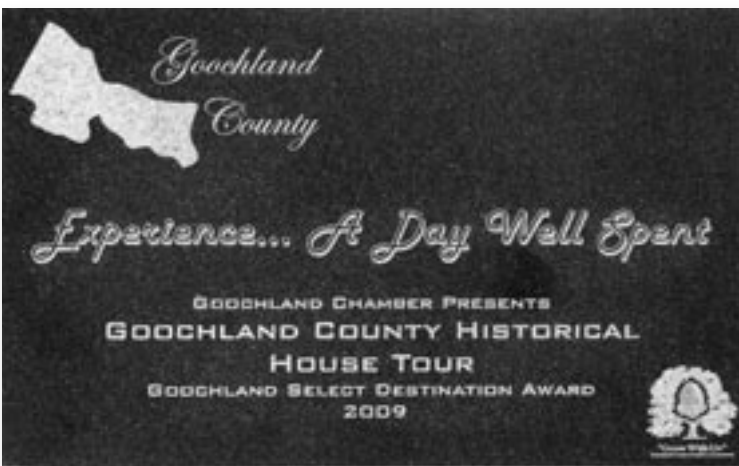

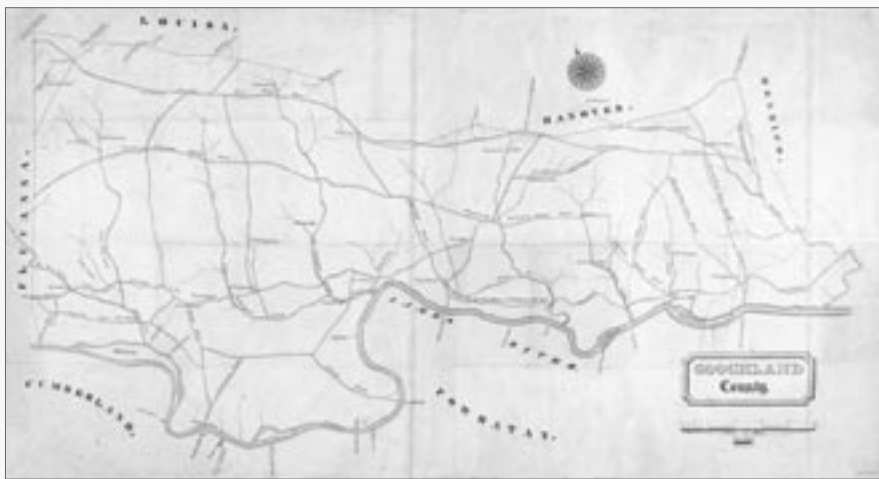
